## **REGISTRATIONS FOR KINDERGARTEN 2021-22**

On-line registration for Kindergarten will begin on January 11th. Please look for details on our school website.

To be accepted into Kindergarten, your child must be five years old before December 31, 2021. To complete the registration package for Kindergarten, we will need proof of your child's birth date, such as a copy of your child's birth certificate, baptismal certificate, and immigration documents (if applicable) of the child and parents. Proof of home address such as a utility bill or bill of sale for your home may be requested.

Because space is limited in these programs, we encourage you to register your children as soon as possible. Priority is given to Catholic students in our school attendance area. If there are spaces available, Catholic students from outside our attendance area and non-Catholic students will be considered for the available spaces.


## INCLEMENT WEATHER POLICY



The following are used as guidelines by the school to determine if students go outdoors for their breaks or remain indoors when the weather is extreme. We never know what January weather may bring us!

1. The School will check the Environment Canada website: [www.weatheroffice.gc.ca](http://www.weatheroffice.gc.ca) , to determine the temperature.
2. A decision is made by administration as to whether recess will be indoors or outdoors and this will be announced to the whole school.
3. A temperature of  $-20^{\circ}$  Celsius, including wind chill or colder, will keep students indoors during their recess and lunch breaks.
4. Continuous rain and extreme wind conditions will also keep students indoors..
5. Front entry doors are open at 8:40 a.m. Supervision does not start until 8:40 a.m.
6. Students are encouraged to dress appropriately for the weather conditions. Toques, scarves, mitts, boots, ski pants, and warm coats should be worn when coming to and leaving from school.

Recess is a vital time for students to socialize, exercise and enjoy a snack. For these reasons, students will be encouraged to go outside - weather permitting.

**Encyclical Letter: Fratelli Tutti**  
**of the Holy Father, Francis**  
**on Fraternity and Social Friendship**  
**A Summary**

**Introduction**

Inspired by Saint Francis of Assisi, Pope Francis gives us Fratelli Tutti, a proposal for a way of life marked by the flavour of the Gospel. It is a call to love others as brothers and sisters; to recognize and love every person with a love without limits; and to encounter others in a way that is capable of overcoming all distance and every temptation. Fratelli Tutti does not claim to offer a comprehensive teaching on fraternal love but seeks rather to consider its universal scope - the dignity of each and every human person.

**Chapter One: Dark Clouds Over A Closed World**


The first chapter describes the dark clouds that extend to all parts of the world, hindering the development of universal fraternity and leaving many people wounded by the roadside, discarded and rejected. It reflects on the many distortions of the contemporary era: the manipulation and the deformity of democracy, freedom, justice; the loss of the meaning of the social community and history; selfishness and indifference toward the common good; the market system based on profit and the culture of waste; unemployment, racism, poverty; and the disparity of rights. While these inequities may tempt us to raise our arms in surrender, this is not the way to restore hope and bring about renewal. We must follow a culture of the other; of reviving the sense that we are a global community, and that our lifestyles, our relationships, the organization of our societies, and the meaning of our existence, matter.

**Chapter Two: A Stranger On The Road**

The second chapter is dedicated to this figure of the stranger on the road, wounded and cast aside amid the dark clouds of a closed world; a society that has turned its back on the suffering and care of its most frail and vulnerable. Just like the Good Samaritan, we are called to become neighbours to others, to overcome prejudices, personal interests, and historical and cultural barriers. We are called to create a society that includes and integrates the fallen and the suffering. Pope Francis calls us to rediscover our vocation as citizens of our own nations and of the world. He summons us to be builders of a new social order and to be aware that the existence of each and every individual is deeply tied to the other; that Christ is the face of the other.

Epiphany! Theophany! Two good Greek words expressing and proclaiming to the world the showing forth of God in His fullness. In the first centuries of Christianity, the feast of the Epiphany was regarded as a collective feast for it embraced other events in the life of Jesus which bore witness to His divinity – namely, His Nativity, the homage of the Wise Men from the East, the Baptism of the Lord in the river Jordan, the first miracle at the wedding in Cana of Galilee and the miraculous multiplication of the loaves. St. Augustine in his homily on the Feast of the Epiphany said: “Today we celebrate the mystery of the Epiphany on earth. Today God, by means of a star in the heavens, heralded His Nativity; and by baptism in the Jordan, He sanctified water for the renewal of humankind; at a wedding in Cana of Galilee, He changed water into wine; and with five loaves of bread, He fed five thousand people.”

Epiphany is the showing forth of God because it was there, at the Baptism of Jesus, that all three Persons of the Holy Trinity appeared for the first time. The Father’s voice testified from heaven that Jesus is the Son of God. The Son accepted His Father’s testimony, and the Holy Spirit was seen descending from the Father in the form of a dove and resting upon the Son.

“And when Jesus had been baptized, just as He came up from the water, suddenly the heavens were opened to Him and He saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and alighting on Him. And the voice from heaven said, ‘This is my Son, the Beloved, with Whom I am well pleased.’” (Matthew 3: 16-17)

God – Father, Son and Holy Spirit – plays an important role in the life and worship of every Christian. In the Eastern Church we make the sign of the cross with the thumb and first two fingers representing the Father, the Son, and the Holy Spirit. An Eastern Catholic brings these three fingers together to signify that s/he believes not in the three Gods but in One. We are baptized in the name of the Trinity; every liturgy in the Eastern Church begins with the name of the Trinity; we are blessed in the name of the Trinity; we confess our faith in the Holy Trinity when we say in the Nicene Creed: “I believe in One God, the Father, the Almighty... I believe in one Lord, Jesus Christ... I believe in the Holy Spirit, the Lord, the giver of life...”

The doctrine of the Trinity may seem incomprehensible and remote; yet it is one of the basic teachings of the Catholic Church. It is basic because it tells us so much about God, about how Christians have experienced His presence in the past and about how we may experience the fullness of His presence today. Saint Peter and the other apostles, for example, knew God in three ways. They knew God as “Father”. They knew God as: “Son” in the person of Jesus Christ. On Pentecost they experienced God as “Holy Spirit”, as a presence and power within their own hearts and within the Church.

The Trinity means that I believe in God the Father Who made me; God the Son Who saves me, God the Holy Spirit Who lives in me. God the Father: for us in love! God the Son: with us in grace! God the Holy Spirit: in us in power!
